Description:

This course will survey United States History from Reconstruction to Contemporary America. I hope to stimulate students to think of history as an ongoing process of raising questions about the past instead of embalming truths in notebooks and resurrecting them for exams. Along with recounting, analyzing, and interpreting selected issues in U.S. History, this course is designed to introduce students to a variety of new perspectives historical study, and more importantly, help develop analytical skills necessary for every educated person, regardless of his or her professional goals. Another objective is to enhance your ability to evaluate sources of information. An adequate overview of any historical period requires a balance of factual knowledge and critical analysis. Memorization of facts is useless without an understanding how they fit into a bigger picture. We will pursue these goals through a mixture of reading, video, and class discussions

Goals:

□ To introduce critical thinking about issues, subjects, and events in their historical context.

□ To emphasize reading, comprehending, and interpreting primary historical source material and historical maps.

- □ To stress appreciation for cultural diversity, human behaviors, and points of view in American history.
- □ To improve students' knowledge of the American political system.
- □ To promote students' ability to think and learn independently.

Important: Your grade at Impact ECHS and Lee College may differ slightly due to different requirements from each institution.

Course Format: This is a lecture-based course. Tests will consist of short-answer based essay questions as well as multiplechoice sections. The Final Exam will be comprehensive, and **may not be exempted**. It is important that you be able to articulate what you learn. Please be aware that all assignments will be graded based on spelling, grammar, syntax, and the general rules of good communication. Please proofread all of your assignments carefully and correct any errors.

Book Review: Students are <u>required</u> to write a book review of an historical work pertaining to this course, yet of their own choosing subject to my approval. <u>This is an institutional requirement by Lee College and must be completed and turned in</u> <u>on time to pass the course</u>. The book must cover post 1877 time period and must include US History.

Keep in mind that a "book review" is not a "book report!" The purpose of a book review is to evaluate the book. A book review should begin with a summary which should be concise but complete enough to give a general idea of the book and its contents. However, the major portion of such paper should be an evaluative essay. This evaluation should be the reader's reaction to the book with examples indicating why he or she feels as they do. This review should evaluate the book, not the subject of the book.

This should be 500-700 word essay summarizing the book and responding to certain aspects of it such as the interplay between some of the characters. You need to have a thesis concerning the book that you develop in your essay. Here is the model outline:

I. Introduction, including thesis. 1-3 paragraphs

- II. Main Points (body), several paragraphs
 - What are the author's arguments?
 - Does what the book you chose to read agree or disagree with what your textbook said about the topic? (Cite specific pages from the textbook to support your argument here).
 - How successful was the author in doing what he or she set out to do?
 - What are the books strengths and/or weaknesses?
 - Which audience would find this book most enjoyable?
- III. Conclusion (1 paragraph): The conclusion should flow from the main points and reinforce the thesis.

Make-Ups: I strongly encourage you to be present on days when exams and quizzes are scheduled. Make up exams will be in essay format. Make-ups for these exams must be <u>arranged</u> and <u>completed</u> within three business days after the date it was held; otherwise a zero will be recorded for the aforementioned assignment.
